

SUMMERTIME SAFETY

It's springtime again, and another busy and fast summer is on the way. I am reminded that one of our former employees always said, "Around here, it is always winter or summer." It seems to me that he was right.

With the arrival of summer, many folks typically have a list of projects that needs to be completed before the season ends. This list may involve potential contact with electric utility equipment, and that can create a dangerous situation. I want to take this opportunity to remind everyone to pay attention to where you are and what you are doing around electricity so that you stay safe. Here are a few examples of situations that come to mind.

If you irrigate your lawn with an electric water pump, putting that electric water pump in the ditch this summer and hooking up the wiring can lead to danger. Be sure to keep the electrical breaker off until wiring is complete and you are in the clear, then the breaker can be turned on. Remember, electricity and water do not

If you take a notion to remove old branches and leaves from your roof this spring or if you plan to install a roof antenna, be mindful of the electric wiring that brings service into your home. Overhead service wires carry high voltage, and contact with ladders, hand tools, antennas or your body must be avoided. Electrical contact can cause severe burns and falls. In some cases, it can be fatal. Always know where you are, and remember to look up for safety.

Many residences and businesses receive electric service from electric lines that are buried underground. These wires also carry high voltage and can be deadly if precautions are not taken. This means that if you or someone you know is thinking about building a fence that requires setting posts, it is extremely important to have the electric line located to avoid contact with digging tools. To be safe, please call 800-922-1987 and request an underground line locate. Remember, digging bars, shovels, posthole digging equipment and electricity are a dangerous combination. Accidental contact with high-voltage underground lines can be deadly.

Spring and summer are also that time of year when we enjoy outside activities that make us forget about the cold winter that we just went through. Kite flying comes to mind, and yes, even fun things can be potentially dangerous when dealing with overhead power lines. The rule for safety is simple: Do not fly kites around overhead power lines. If you can see power lines from where you are planning to fly a kite, you are probably not far enough away. Be aware that kites will drift with the wind. Electricity always looks for the shortest path to ground, and moist or dirty kite strings can provide that path. Obviously, these are just a few things to consider as we work and enjoy our spring and summer season.
